

Brisbane Bandana



This kerchief style scarf is knit side to side, using simple increases on one edge to create a triangle shape, with eyelet accents. One hank of Queensland Brisbane creates a nice effect, with gradient color changes highlighting the wedge shape.

Special Note: After the first row, slip the first stitch of each row purlwise to create a nice, smooth edge.

Using long tail method, cast on 6 stitches. Knit 4 rows.

1. Increase row: K1, PM, KFB, Knit across, The marker is there to help you remember where to make the increases.

2. Wrong side row: K3, P to last 3 stitches, K3.

Continue these two rows until the piece measures 4 inches from cast on edge and you have an even number of stitches.. Work Eyelet Inset as follows:

1. K1, SM, KFB, P to last 3 stitches, K3.
2. K3, P to last 3 stitches, K3.
3. K1, SM, KFB, *YO, K2Tog*, K3.
4. K3, P to last 3 stitches, K3.
5. K1, SM, KFB, P to last 3 stitches, K3
6. K3, P to last three stitches, K3.

Work the original pattern (stockinette center, working an increase on the beginning end of each right side row) for about 2 " and you have an even number of stitches, then work another section of the eyelet pattern. Alternate these two sections until most of the yarn is done, reserving about 10 yards. Knit 4 rows. Bind off very loosely. Wet block, pulling to open up the eyelets.
